Seedlings of various native species will be distributed free. Up to five trees per household, with a limit of two per species. Replant trees you lost in recent storms or add trees to your yard! Instructions will be available. Need not be a resident.

The trees are seedlings:

- Bare root and range in size from one to four feet in length,
- Various deciduous and conifer native species, depending on what selections we receive (see attached list),
- Plant promptly, or store in a cool, damp location for a day or so.
- Need to be protected from deer predation,
- Need to be kept watered through the first year or two.
- Bring your own bucket, bag or container to bring your trees home in.

First come, first served. No prior reservations.

PLANTING AND CARE INSTRUCTIONS

It is best to plant bare root trees immediately, in order to keep the fragile roots from drying out. If you can't plant because of weather or soil conditions, store the trees in a cool place and keep the roots moist.



Unpack tree and soak in water 3 to 6 hours. Do not plant with packing materials attached to roots, and do not allow roots to dry out.



Plant the tree at the same depth it stood in the nursery, without crowding the roots. Partially fill the hole, firming the soil around the lower roots. Do not add soil amendments.





After the water has soaked in, place a 2-inch deep protective mulch area 3 feet in diameter around the base of the tree (but not touching the trunk).



Dig a hole, wider than seems necessary, so the roots can spread without crowding. Remove any grass within a three-foot circular area.



Shovel in the remaining soil. It should be firmly, but not tightly packed with your heel. Construct a water-holding basin around the tree. Give the tree plenty of water.



Water the tree generously every week or 10 days during the first year.

7. Seedlings MUST be protected from deer browse! (by netting, fencing)
