Join Anne and Ridley Enslow for their musical presentation, *Lafayette: Music for the Marquis* at the Bouman-Stickney Farmstead inside the Wade-Wyckoff Barn. This show follows Lafayette's life, from his childhood in the court of France to his service in the American Revolution. Arriving in this country at the age of 19, he almost immediately became a hero at the Battle of Brandywine.

For this presentation Anne Enslow will play the hammered dulcimer, an instrument documented to have been in the American Colonies, and Ridley Enslow will play a violin, in this case a

violin made in 1776. They both sing. Before each song Anne gives an interesting and entertaining introduction to the piece, setting the context in American history.
